

Special Educational Needs Information Report

1) Aims of our provision in regards to pupils with special educational needs and/or disability

The aims of our policy and practice in relation to special educational need and disability in this academy are:

• To make reasonable adjustments for those with a disability by taking action to increase access to the curriculum, the environment and to printed information for all.

- To ensure that children and young people with SEND engage in the activities of the academy alongside pupils who do not have SEND.
- To reduce barriers to progress by embedding the principles in the National Curriculum Inclusion statement

• To use our best endeavours to secure special educational provision for pupils for whom this is required, that is "additional to and different from" that provided within the differentiated curriculum, to better respond to the four broad areas of need:

- 1. Cognition and Learning.
- 2. Communication and Interaction
- 3. Social Emotional and mental health difficulties
- 4. Sensory and /or physical needs

• To request, monitor and respond to parent/carers' and pupils' views in order to evidence high levels of confidence and partnership.

- To ensure a high level of staff expertise to meet pupil need, through well-targeted continuing professional development.
- To support pupils with medical conditions to achieve full inclusion in all academy activities by ensuring consultation with health and social care professionals in order to meet the medical needs of pupils.

• To work in cooperative and promote productive partnership with the Local Authority and other outside agencies, to ensure there is a multiprofessional approach to meeting the needs of all vulnerable learners.

2) What are special educational needs (SEN) or a disability?

At our academy we use the definition for SEN and for disability from the SEND Code of Practice (2014). This states:

• **Special Educational Needs**: A child or young person has special educational needs if he or she has a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her.

* A learning difficulty or disability is a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of others of the same age.

* Special educational provision means educational or training provision that is additional to, or different from, that made generally for others of the same age in a mainstream setting in England

Disability: Many children and young people who have SEN may have a disability under the Equality Act 2010 – that is '...**a physical or mental impairment which has a long-term and substantial adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities'**. This definition includes sensory impairments such as those affecting sight or hearing, and long-term health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, epilepsy, and cancer.

3) The kinds of special educational needs (SEN) for which provision is made at the academy (Schedule 1: point 1)

• Children and young people with SEN have different needs, but the general presumption is that all children with SEN but without an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) are welcome to apply for a place at our academy, in line with the academy admissions policy. If a place is available, we will undertake to use our best endeavours, in partnership with parents, to make the provision required to meet the SEN needs of pupils at this academy.

• For children with an EHCP, parents have the right to request a particular school and the local authority must comply with that preference and name the school or college in the EHC plan unless:

o it would be unsuitable for the age, ability, aptitude or SEN of the child or young person, or

o the attendance of the child or young person there would be incompatible with the efficient education of others, or the efficient use of resources.
Before making the decision to name our academy in a child's EHCP, the local authority will send the governing body a copy of the EHCP and then consider their comments very carefully before a final decision on placement is made. In addition, the local authority must also seek the agreement of school where the draft EHCP sets out any provision to be delivered on their premises that have been secured through a direct payment (personal budget).

• Parents of a child with an EHCP also have the right to seek a place at a special school if it they consider that their child's needs can be better met in specialist provision.

4) How does our academy know if children need extra help? (SE7 1 Q1) (Schedule 1: Point 2)

We know when a pupil needs help if:

• Concerns are raised by parents/carers, external agencies, teachers, the pupil's previous school or the pupil themselves, regarding concerns relating to inadequate levels of progress or inclusion.

- Screening, such as that completed on entry or as a result of a concern being raised, indicates gap in knowledge and/or skills.
- Whole academy tracking of attainment outcomes indicates lack of expected rate of progress.

• Observation of the pupil indicates that they have additional needs taking into account parents' aspirations for their child. Parents and the pupil will also be consulted on the action they can take to support attainment of the desired outcomes. This will be recorded and a date made for reviewing attainment.

5) What should a parent do if it thinks their child may have special educational needs? (SE7 1 Q1) (Schedule 1: Points 2 and 4)

• If parents have concerns relating to their child's learning or inclusion then please initially discuss these with your child's teacher/subject teacher/ form tutor. This then may result in a referral to the academy SENDCo whose name is Kristian Wallworth and whose contact details are <u>k.wallworth@josephleckieacademy.co.uk</u> Parents are encouraged to contact the SENCDo or the Principal directly if they feel this is more appropriate.

• All parents will be listened to. Their views and their aspirations for their child will be central to the assessment and provision that is provided by the academy.

6) How will the academy support a child with SEND? (SE7 Q2) (Schedule 1: Points 2, 3, 6, 8 and 10)

• All pupils will be provided with high quality teaching that is differentiated to meet the needs of all learners. The quality of classroom teaching provided to pupils with SEND is monitored through a number of processes that include:

1. classroom observation by the Senior Leadership Team (SLT) and Heads of Faculties.

2. ongoing assessment of progress made by pupils with SEND,

3. work sampling and scrutiny of planning to ensure effective matching of work to pupil need,

4. teacher meetings with the SENDCo to provide advice and guidance on meeting the needs of pupils with SEND (referring to pupil passport when planning and differentiating lessons).

5. pupil and parent feedback on the quality and effectiveness of interventions provided,

6. attendance and behaviour records.

• Pupils with a disability will be provided with reasonable adjustments (such as auxiliary aids and services) to overcome any disadvantage experienced in academys and increase their access to the taught curriculum.

• All pupils have individual national curriculum targets set in line with national outcomes to ensure ambition. Parents are informed of these via the reporting system and also at events such as Parents' Evenings.

• Pupils' attainments are tracked using the academy's internal tracking system and those failing to make expected levels of progress are identified very quickly. These pupils are then discussed in termly progress meetings that are undertaken between the class/subject teacher and if necessary a member of the SLTand if appropriate, the pupil themselves.

• Additional action to increase the rate of progress will be then identified and recorded that will include a review of the impact of the differentiated teaching being provided to the child, and if required, provision to the teacher of additional strategies to further support the success of the pupil.

• Where it is decided during this early discussion that special educational provision is required to support increased rates of attainment, parents will be informed that the academy considers their child may require SEN support and their partnership sought in order to improve attainments.

• Action relating to SEN support will follow an assess, plan, do and review model:

1. Assess: Data on the pupil held by the academy will be collated by the class/subject teacher and where necessary the SENDCo in order to make an accurate assessment of the pupil's needs. Parents will always be invited to this early discussion to support the identification of action to improve outcomes.

2. **Plan**: If review of the action taken indicates that "additional to and different from" support will be required, then the views of all involved including the parents and the pupil will be obtained and appropriate evidence-based interventions identified, recorded and implemented by the class/subject teacher with advice from the SENDCo.

3. Do: SEN support will be recorded on a plan that will identify a clear set of expected outcomes, which will include stretching and relevant academic and developmental targets (this may include for young people, targets around preparing for adulthood) that take

into account parents' aspirations for their child. Parents and the pupil will also be consulted on the action they can take to support attainment of the desired outcomes. This will be recorded and a date made for reviewing attainment.

4. **Review**: Progress towards these outcomes will be tracked and reviewed termly with the parents and the pupil.

If progress rates are judged to be inadequate despite the delivery of high quality interventions, advice will always be sought from external agencies regarding strategies to best meet the specific needs of a pupil. This will only be undertaken after parent permission has been obtained and may include referral to:

- 1. Local Authority Support Services
- 2. Specialists in other schools e.g. teaching schools, special schools.
- 3. Social Services
- 4. Health partners such as School Nurse and Child & Adolescent Mental Health Service

N.B. For a very small percentage of pupils, whose needs are significant and complex and the SEN Support required to meet their needs cannot reasonably be provided from within the academy's own resources, a request will be made to the local authority to conduct an assessment of education, health and care needs. This may result in an Education, Health and Care (EHC) plan being provided.

7) How will pupils be involved in decisions regarding provision that can better meet their needs? (Schedule 1: Point 8)

This academy uses pupil centred profiles. These are completed by the SENDCo, pupils themselves and help identify their abilities and strengths, their personal aims and the action they require to be taken by the academy to reduce barriers to learning and social success. Each term, this information will be reviewed and the pupil's views gained on the effectiveness of the action taken so far to meet their needs.

8) How will the curriculum be matched to each child's needs? (SE7 Q3) (Schedule 1: Point 3)

- Teachers plan using pupils' achievement levels, differentiating tasks to ensure progress for every pupil in the classroom.
- When a pupil has been identified as having special educational needs, the curriculum and the learning environment will be further adapted by the class teacher to reduce barriers to learning and enable them to access the curriculum more easily.
- These adaptations may include strategies suggested by the SENDCo and/or external specialists.

• In addition if it is considered appropriate, pupils may be provided with specialised equipment or resources such as ICT and/or additional adult help. All actions taken by the class teacher will be recorded and shared with parents.

9) How will parents know how their child is doing? (SE7 Q4) (Schedule 1: Point 7)

• Attainments towards the identified outcomes will be shared with parents through feedback regarding SEN support reviews but also through the academy reporting system and Parents' Evenings.

• Parents are encouraged to arrange an appointment to discuss their child's progress with, the SENDCo or Head of Year (HOY) at any time when they feel concerned or have information they feel they would like to share that could impact on their child's success. 10) How will parents be helped to support their child's learning? (SE7 Q4) (Schedule 1: Point 7)

• Please look at the academy website. It can be found at <u>www.josephleckieacademy.co.uk</u> and includes links to resources/portals that we have found useful in supporting parents to help their child learn at home. In addition:

• The class/subject teacher, HOY or SENDCo may also suggest additional ways of supporting your child's learning.

• The academy organises a number of after school activities, including period 6 for year 11. These are advertised on our website and aim to provide useful opportunities for parents to learn more about how to support your child's learning.

• If you have ideas on support that you would like to have access to in order to further support your child's learning, please contact the SENDCo who will locate information and guidance for you in this area.

11) How will the academy evaluate the effectiveness of the SEN provision made for pupils? (Schedule 1: Point 3)

The effectiveness of SEN provision will be measured using both qualitative and quantitative data. Qualitative data will gather the views of parents and pupils on how successful the provision has been in enabling them to attain their outcomes. Quantitative data will examine both progress and attainment levels compared to those achieved nationally for pupils with the same level prior learning level. This data will be shared with governors and be judged by external moderators such as Ofsted.

12) What support will there be for children overall well-being? (SE7 Q5) (Schedule 1: Point 3)

The academy offers a wide variety of pastoral support for pupils. This includes:

• Personal Development Programme (PDP) curriculum that aims to provide pupils with the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to enhance their emotional and social knowledge and well-being.

• Pupil and Parent voice mechanisms are in place and are monitored for effectiveness by the Senior leaders who have responsibility for this area.

• Small group evidence-led interventions to support pupil's well-being are delivered to targeted pupils and groups. These are identified in conjuction with the Student Support Unit and aim to support improved interaction skills, emotional resilience and well-being.

• The academy has an Anti-bullying Policy and is audited annually for its provision in regard to ensuring pupils safety.

13) Pupils with medical needs (Statutory duty under the Children and Families Act) (SE7 5)

• Pupils with medical needs will be provided with a detailed Individual Health and Care Plan, compiled in partnership with external agenices and parents and if appropriate, the pupil themselves.

• Staff who volunteer to administer and supervise medications, will complete formal training and be verified as being competent.

• All medicine administration procedures adhere to the LA policy and Department of Education (DfE) guidelines included within *Supporting pupils at school with medical conditions* (DfE) 2014 and identified in the Academy's Medicine Administration Policy.

14) What specialist services are available at the academy? (SE7 Q6)

The academy has access to a range of specialist support that are identified in (6) above.

15) What training do the staff supporting children and young people with SEND undertake? (SE7 Q7) (Schedule 1: Point 5)

Enhanced training has been provided to and is ongoing for Teaching Assistants

Specialist training has been provided to the SENDCo on:

- The SEN Coordination award.
- The Speech Language Therapist visits regularly to assess and plan support for targeted pupils.
- Risk assessments are carried out and procedures are put in place to enable all children to participate in all academy activities.
- The academy ensures it has sufficient staff expertise to ensure that no child with SEND is excluded from any academy provided activity.

17) How accessible is the academy environment? (SE7 Q9) (Schedule 1: Point 3)

Our Accessibility Plan (statutory requirement) describes the actions the academy has taken to increase access to the environment, the curriculum and to printed information is available via the academy website.

18) How will the academy prepare/support my child when joining or transferring to a new school? (SE7 Q10) (Schedule 1: Point 12)

A number of strategies are in place to enable effective pupils' transition. These include:

On entry:

• A planned introduction programme is delivered in the Summer term to support transfer for pupils starting the academy in September (SEND Transition Days).

• Parent/carers are invited to a meeting at the academy and are provided with a range of information to support them in enabling their child to settle into the school routine.

• The SENDCo meets with all new parents of pupils who are known to have SEND to allow concerns to be raised and solutions to any perceived challenges to be located prior to entry.

• If pupils are transferring from another setting, the previous school records will be requested immediately and a meeting set up with parents to identify and reduce any concerns.

Transition to the next school, preparation for adulthood and independent living (Schedule 1: Point 12)

Primary:

• The transition programme in place for pupils provides a number of opportunities for pupils and parents to meet staff in the new school. These opportunities are further enhanced for pupils with SEND.

• The annual review in Y5 for pupils with a statement of educational need or an EHCP begins the process where parents are supported to make decisions regarding secondary school choice.

• Parents will be encouraged to consider options for the next phase of education and the school will involve outside agencies, as appropriate, to ensure information provided is comprehensive but accessible.

- Accompanied visits to other providers may be arranged as appropriate. .
- For pupils transferring to local schools, the SENDCos of both schools will meet to discuss the needs of pupils with SEN in order to ensure a smooth transition.
- Feedback from last year's pupils on the effectiveness of the transition process is reviewed and where necessary adapted.

• The records of pupils who leave the academy mid-phase will be transferred within five working days of the parents notifying their child has been enrolled at another school.

After school:

• The academy adheres to the guidance in *Careers guidance and inspiration in schools: Statutory guidance for governing bodies, school leaders and school staff* April 2014. This places a duty on schools to secure independent careers guidance for all Y8-13 pupils. This guidance includes information on the range of education or training options, including apprenticeships and other vocational pathways.

• Parents may like to use the website of the National Careers Service that offers information and professional advice about education, training and work to people of all ages. https://nationalcareersservice.direct.gov.uk or examine options identified in the local offer published by the local authority which sets out details of SEN provision - including the full range of post-16 options – and support available to children and young people with SEN and disabilities to help them prepare for adulthood, including getting a job.

• Where a student has an EHCP, all reviews of that Plan from Year 9 at the latest, and onwards, will include a focus on preparing for adulthood, including employment, independent living and participation in society.

How are the academy's resources allocated and matched to children's special educational needs? (SE7 Q11) (Schedule 1: Point 6)

• The academy receives funding to respond to the needs of pupils with SEND from a number of sources that includes:

1. A proportion of the funds allocated per pupil to the academy to provide for their education.

2. The Notional SEN budget. This is a fund devolved to academy's to support them to meet the needs of pupils with SEND.

3. For those pupils with the most complex needs, the academy may be allocated additional educational needs funding from the Local Authorities High Needs SEN Funding allocation.

• This funding is then used to provide the equipment and facilities to support pupils with special educational needs and disabilities through support that might include:

1. Targeted differentiation to increase access to text (desk copies of information, work buddy, accessible text, IT e.g. read aloud software, different recording strategies, additional time etc..)

2. In class, adult or peer support aimed at increasing skills in specific area of weakness (learning behaviours, organisation, etc)

3. Out of class support (relationship building, social, emotional skill development,)

4. Small group tuition to enable catch up (subject or targeted at additional need)

5. Specific support, advice and guidance is provided to parents and families to improve pupil's readiness for learning (relating to pupil's difficulties in attendance, behaviour, physiological and emotional needs etc)

6. Provision of specialist resources or equipment (use of ICT, sloping board, electronic versions of text etc)

7. Partnership working with other agencies (shared resources, shared expertise: support from local authority on action to improve inclusion: shared alternative environments etc.)

8. Access to targeted before/after school clubs (breakfast, homework, clubs targeted at increasing resilience)

9. Access to the academy nurse and wider health professional support (responding to mental and physical health issues, speech, language and communication needs, motor control and mobility needs)

10. Access to support from in-house sources e.g. learning mentors (peer or adult) or from charities (e.g. Barnardos, Relate) and community sources (e.g. Youth groups and local businesses)

11. Implementation of strategies from support agencies e.g. Behaviour Support/Educational Welfare Support

In addition:

• The Pupil Premium funding provides additional funding for pupils who are claiming Free School Meals, who are in the care of the local authority or whose parents are in the Armed Services. The deployment of this evaluated and the outcomes are monitored for effectiveness.

• If parents wish to discuss the options available for their child, they are welcome to make an appointment to see the class/subject teacher, Year Manager SENdCo or a member of SLT.

19) How is the decision made about how much support each child will receive? (SE7 12) (Schedule 1: Point 7)

• For pupils with SEN but without a statement of educational need/EHCP, the decision regarding the support provided will be with the SENDCo, classteacher and parent who will follow guidance provided by the Governing Body regarding SEN Funding deployment.

• For pupils with a statement of educational need/EHCP, this decision will be reached in agreement with parents when the EHCP is being produced or at an annual review.

20) How will I be involved in discussions about and planning for my child's education? (SE7 Q 13) (Schedule 1: Point 7)

This will be through:

- discussions with the class teacher, HOY, SENDCo or SLT.
- during parents evenings,
- meetings with support and external agencies.

In addition, our academy has a forum for parents and carers of children and young people with SEND. All are invited to attend meetings to raise issues of concern and to ensure the academy provision is responsive to pupil and family needs.

21) Who can I contact for further information or if I have any concerns? (SE7 Q 14) (Schedule 1: Point 9)

If you wish to discuss your child's SEN needs or are unhappy about any issues regarding the academy's response to meeting these needs please contact the following

- Your child's class teacher, HOY, SENDCo or SLT.
- For complaints, please contact the Academy, following the complaints policy available under policies.

• Parents and carers can also appeal to the Government's SEND tribunal if you disagree with the Local Authorities decisions about your child's special educational needs. You can also appeal to the tribunal if the school or council has discriminated against your disabled child.
