Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you are continuing to stay safe and well. I know there is a lot of uncertainty in relation to the new variant of coronavirus and this is causing a higher level of concern for us all. As an academy, we continue to take our responsibility seriously and aim to do all we can to prevent the spread of the virus among members of the academy community.

We are pleased that rates of infection in our area of Walsall appear to be below the national average at this time, although we take nothing for granted. We are also pleased that the take up of the vaccinations and booster jabs is going well and we would encourage this for everyone who is eligible.

The day involved our students working in teams to come up with possible projects to support members of the local community. It was a very intense day with much hard work and interaction with the coaches who were there to support the teams in their decision-making and project planning. The day culminated in some amazing presentations and the awarding of prizes from the judging panel. The winning project will now go forward to receive funding and will become a reality so that our students can be directly involved in supporting and improving the lives of members of the local community.

At the end of term, we often have to sadly say farewell to some of our colleagues who are leaving for new challenges and opportunities. At the end of this term, we are saying goodbye to Mr Poppleton who has worked at Joseph Leckie for a number of years, supporting students through our mentoring programme. He is leaving to take up a post to become an assistant educational psychologist, something he has long had an ambition to do. Whilst we are very sad that he is leaving, we are delighted that he has been successful in his application and wish him all the very best for the future.

We are also saying goodbye to Mr Howells who has been a teacher and leader at Joseph Leckie for 35 years! That is an amazing record and achievement.
